Day One of Crime Victim Services exists to provide holistic healing for survivors of sexual violence and human trafficking. Our dedicated, professional advocates walk alongside survivors throughout their healing journey, providing comprehensive services in Allen, Auglaize, Putnam, and Hardin Counties.

We're Here to Help

We provide a 24/7 hotline, 24/7 medical advocacy at local hospitals, crisis intervention and safety planning for survivors of sexual violence and human trafficking. Additionally, we offer ongoing support and case management services, therapy, support groups and legal advocacy in local court systems.

We also give assistance and linkage to other services in our community for basic needs. We coordinate our local Sexual Assault Multidisciplinary Action Response Team to ensure systems coordination for survivors. We assist partners in developing protocols to provide them with a process of how to identify and help survivors.

Campus Specific Services

We walk alongside any college student impacted by sexual violence and those who are going through the campus conduct or Title IX process. We ensure they receive supportive advocacy and safety planning throughout the process and after it is completed.

We strive to reach out to communities who have higher rates of victimization but have not been served due to various barriers. We want to ensure survivors of sexual violence and human trafficking know about our services and receive culturally appropriate, trauma responsive care when they come to us for help.

We offer basic and advanced training to community members, college students, and professionals on trauma, sexual harassment, sexual violence, human trafficking, cultural humility, Title IX, and bystander intervention.
